Poetry, it has been said, flourishes when all else is uncertain. With that in mind, renowned literary historian and translator, Rakhshanda Jalil, uses Urdu poetry to look at how the social fabric of secular India is being destroyed. Rakhshanda delves into the past, to the events that have threatened communal harmony, from the bloodletting of partition, or the politics of successive elections, to communal riots, Mumbai, Gujarat and so on, to the present moment, to recent events around Ayodhya, cow slaughter or 'love jihad'.

The book is divided into four sections: politics, people, passion, places. Strewn with delightful, thoughtful Urdu couplets that bring depth, lyricism and gravitas to the narratives, the writer cautions us against current popular sentiments based on hating the 'other' and how a populism that is devoid of moral authority, if it begins to operate outside the rule of law, can be a threat to democracy.

Dr Rakhshanda Jalil is a multi-award-winning translator, writer, and literary historian. She has published over 25 books and written over 50 academic papers and essays. 
Of Mothers and Other Perishables, plunges into the turbulent waters of bereavement from the perspective of the bereaved as well as the deceased. The still, calm and often morbidly funny voice of a dead woman, which echoes through the walls of her beloved 'storeroom', unravels a life truncated by the onset of a disease (although the disease is only referred to obtusely, and never named). She reminisces about the past; the storeroom, with its silk sarees wrapped in muslin, albums of black-and-white photographs, collection of vinyl records, and old leather suitcases; cupboards full of baby clothes become the quaint Bioscope of her life in Delhi as a young woman in the 1970s and 80s- decades that bring her romance, marriage, and motherhood.

There are inconsistencies in the narrator's memory with shards and fragments of it missing. It is this disjointedness that makes them poignant, emotionally turgid vignettes. Unable to part with her family, she also observes them in the present with a gaze that is both affectionate and critical. The novel oscillates between the dead woman's yearnings and the immediacy and excitement of a parallel narrative – her daughter's. The dead woman's daughter is a study in prolonged mourning. Melancholia tinges everything she chooses to do – it seeps into relationships like a damp patch on a wall, it gets in the way of her career in advertising.

With parts of it set against the backdrop of the political turmoil of a Citizenship Amendment Act, the anthemic fervour of Urdu poet Faiz Ahmad Faiz's 'Hum Dekhenge' (We Shall Witness) ripples through the novel, stirring its protagonists, causing them to emerge from their office cubicles, leading them towards the pounding heart of the city. Personal and political histories collide, and both the dead woman narrator and The Wailer find themselves engulfed in new treacheries.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Radhika Oberoi is a writer based in New Delhi who has worked in advertising for around seventeen years. In 2014, she was accepted at the University of East Anglia for an MA in Creative Writing (Prose Fiction). She graduated with distinction, and subsequently wrote a novel titled *Stillborn Season*, published by Indian independent publisher Speaking Tiger Books in October 2018. Amongst the multitudes of tombs in the City of the Dead in Cairo, there lies buried a lone Indian — an eminent scholar, writer, debonair statesman and a leader of the Indian freedom movement. Who is he? How did he get there?

For a man who used both the lectern and the pen to devastating effect in the cause of the Indian Independence movement led by the likes of Gandhi, Pacel and Nehru, very little is known of Syud Hossain. Born to an anissocratic family in Calcutta, he started a career in journalism early in life and became the editor of Motifal Nehrus nationalist newspaper, The Independent. 
Eventually, he landed in the United States where he imparted Gandhi's message far and wide across the country. Gathering a group of indian freedom fighters around him, he fought for India's freedom from afar, decrying Birlish oppression and garnering support in the United States for his cause. Filtring from one place to another, making homes of hotel rooms, Syud Hossain inspired and inked in equal measure. With every speech he delivered and every editorial he penned, he sent a shiver down the spine of the colonial ruler.

Adding to his formidable list of causes, Hossain also took on the fight for Indian immigrant rights in the United States, one that successfully culminated in President Traman signing the Luce-Celler Bill into an Act in 1946. He returned to India to witness the triumph of her independence as well as the tragedy of Gandhi's assassination. He was appointed the first ever Indian ambassador to Egypt, where he died while in service and was laid to rest in Cairo.

A Forgotten Ambassodor in Cairo offers an illuminating narrative of Hossain's life interspersed with historical details that landscapes a vivid political picture of that era. Through primary sources that include Hossain's private papers, the British Intelligence files, letters of his friends and contemporary newspapers, N.S.
